In team play the Salem netters have had two matches with Wake Forest. Rain forced the ending of a match here at Salem last week with Salem leading as play ended. The re-match held at Wake Forest this past Tuesday saw Peggy Spilman and Boodie Wiltshire victorious both in their singles and doubles matches. Wake took the rest of the matches with Trina Griffith, Jane Lockwood, Margo Woodin, Madelyn Rankin, Karen Lancaster and Anne Coxhead participating.

Student-faculty tennis is still going on on most Saturday mornings. "The more the merrier" is the prevailing attitude, so feel free to hit the courts first chance that comes up.

As you finish exams and take off for the summer, keep an eye on the sports world—especially when the summer Olympics open in Munich—You might even get a glimpse of a fellow Salemite!

Exam Schedule

Exams for this spring semester begin on Friday, May 12th and continue through Wednesday afternoon, May 17th. The three periods in which the exams will be taken are at 9:00 a.m., 2:00 p.m., and 7:00 p.m. Students may pick up their exam anytime 30 minutes before the beginning of the exam period and must be turned in within 15 minutes after the exam period.

The points of distribution for the semester's exams are: the office of the Science Building, Dean Hixon's Office (instead of the faculty lounge as was last year), and the Seminar Room in the Fine Arts Center. Exams must be taken in the building where distributed. On May 16th and 17th, all exams will be given out in Main Hall, and the exams must be taken there also.

The freshmen and juniors are in charge of all the procedures concerning exams. If one does not show up to work at their designated time, there will be a fine of \$10.00. It is the responsibility which each student must realize in order to have a successful exam period.

Remember to have another student in the room with you when taking your exam, and if your exam is an open book exam, take it in the areas designated. Those areas are room 106 in the Science Building, room 302 in Main Hall, and the Fine Arts Center Library.

We are lucky here at Salem to have self-scheduling exams, so thank you to all the rules which are here for our own safety. Remember that we want to be able to "enjoy" exams as much next year as this—GOOD LUCK and HAVE FUN!
