The program will also outline the curriculum, the methods of teaching and study, and the student life which exists in today's law school.

Salem Is One Of Sixteen Institutions To Participate In Internship Program

Salem College will be participating in an Administrative Intern Program for Women in Higher Education during the 1974-1975 academic year. The announcement came from Dr. Chandler during the January semester.

Funded by the Carnegie Corporation, the program will provide an administrative internship at each of the sixteen participating institutions. Designed to provide colleges and universities with a supply of qualified women for entry-level positions in all phases of academic administration, the program will stress training in areas such as financial aid, admissions, business affairs, academic affairs, public relations and development.

The ten-month internship includes a two week summer workshop in academic administration. Each intern will work with a

The presentations comprising this one day program are not meant to portray only the "Wake Forest story", but to give the participant a general view of the legal profession and the characteristics of legal education which most law schools share in common. to seek admission to law school. It will also attempt to set some general guidelines to the undergraduate in preparation for law school.

The program is scheduled for Saturday, February 23. There will be a registration fee of \$10 which includes the price of lunch. The program will begin at 10:00 a.m. and continue until 5:00 p.m.
