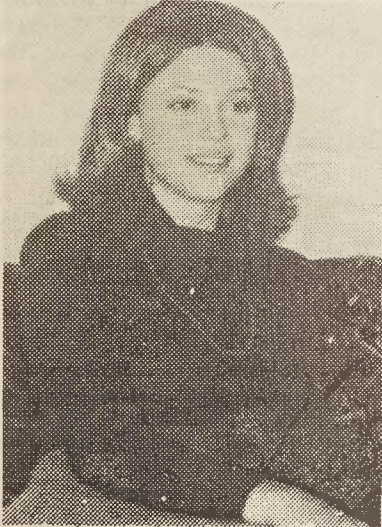
The Winston-Salem Evaluation Office assists the city manager in evaluating city departments and projects. For example, while Carol was there, they evaluated the city's public safety program facilities.
