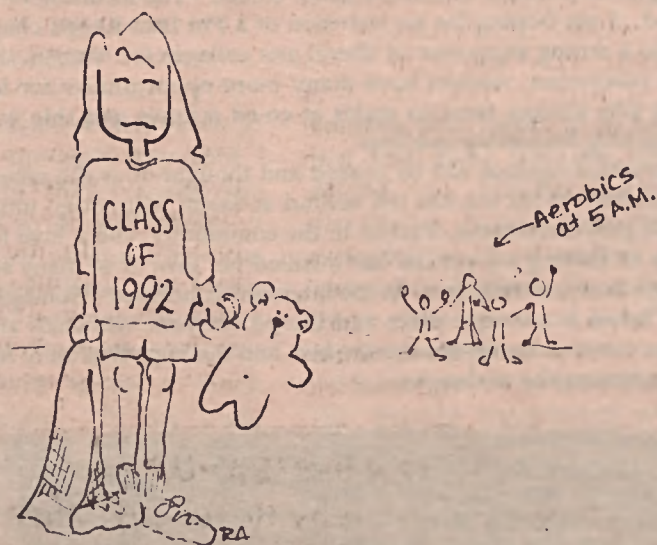

A witch "uses her love and knowledge...to ease...the body and the mind, and to restore harmony and balance in the world...[she] takes full credit and rejoices in her power, and refuses to ascribe it to luck...[she] feels that she is doing exactly what she wants to do." Whether women are heart surgeons, executive financial brokers, politicians, interior designers, or home makers we are positive about the world. We take different approaches when others believed there was no approach. Women, as successful and surviving witches, "must affirm our special qualities: our instinct for cooperation, our perceptiveness of the emotional states of others, our style of leadership by consensus, our

drive to build connections and community, and our love of Nature" and the world, in general. By following these guidelines, every single Salem woman from the freshman class to the senior class through the Salem alumni, can do and achieve anything.

Some advice to "all of us Salem women...feel affirmed in our powers, in our instincts and in our gender, and to embark with enthusiasm and love on our career [and our lives] as very modern and splendidly successful witches." ## Emergency Phones Installed

As a result of student inquiries and articles expressing their concern for the need of student access phones in the academic buildings. Steve Wright, the head of Public Safety, has met their needs by purchasing more phones. The phones are specifically for students use in the event of an emergency, the reporting of suspicious persons, the reporting of possible crimes and the request for escorts.

The new student access emergency phones connected to public safety are located on the second and third floors of Main Hall, the second and third floors of the Science Building, and the north and south halls of the Fine Arts Center, and the halls of the Fine Arts Center basement, and second and third floor Gramley Library by next Monday, May 8. Students can use the phones after 5:00 pm. The phones will not be in operation between 8:00 am and 5:00 pm since other phones will be available in the event of an emergency.

The student access phones can be recognized by what Steve Wright refers to as their "Salem Blue" color. In order to use the phones students must dial the Public Safety number: 2718. The phones are only for the use of contacting Public Safety. As Steve Wright said, "They are here for your safety, we encourage your use of them not your abuse of them."

There has been some confusion about the use of the Admissions Parking Lot. Steve Wright would like to apologize for misleading statements from his new staff which told students they could park there. The sign was recently ripped down by a male and has not yet been replaced. However, if you look in your student handbook on page 28 under Security and Safety under Cars Item C you will find that "vehicles parked in Fire lanes, Admissions Lot, medical staff parking, RHD's lot, Inspector's Lot, Handicapped Space, and all reserved spaces that are marked by signs will result in violation tickets and fines and are subject to being towed."
