INFORMATION GAINED QUICKLY FROM DICTIONARY

The dictionary is a book in which TOASTER'S HANDBOOK filled with jokes, the words of a language or some part of a language are listed alphabetically with their meanings, pronunciation and so forth. In addition to the main alphabet, it contains number of special features; as gazetter information, flags, and key to abbreviations. Some of the most important information found in dictionaries are abbreviations, antonyms, derivation of words --- the language from which the word is de rived -- flags and seals, foreign words and phrases, geographical names, geography, good English usu-age--colloquial, obsolete, slang -illustrations, maps, definitions, PATRIOTISM parts of speech, plural forms, pronunciation, proper names, punc - tuation marks, quotations, speeling, suffixes, synonyms, and verbs whose principal parts are given. Dictionaries separate transitive verbs from intransitive verbs. When one uses the dictionary, he not only finds the definition or pronunciation of a word, but finds synonyms, antonyms, and any other information he might need to secure about a word.
