STUDENTS TO RECEIVE MORE EXTENSIVE HOME TRAINING

Added guidance in the vocational home economics field is provided at Bailey High School this year following the acquisition of a George Deen School of Home Economics.

This department, under the supervision of Mrs. H.E. Rogers, increases the benefits obtainable from a course in home economics and gives the student a better background for future homemaking.

Besides recitations and manipulation in the laboratory, this course provides time for conferences, problem solving projects and field work. It stimulates thinking, judgment, and managerial ability in students.

HOME PROJECTS REQUIRED

Under this new system each pupil has definite home projects undertaken by the pupil under the guidance of the teacher and the cooperation of the home. This is to be carried on only in the home but must be based on school work.

The teacher plans to visit the students in their homes to acquaint herself with the family and home life of her pupil. This gives the teacher information that can be used in planning her classes, and helps the girl in planning her project.
