Swamped by ever-increasing needs for war equipment, Uncle Sam will again through the Fourth War Loan Drive offer Americans the opportunity to continue their support of the government by a loan.

Reasoning should convince us students that we stand to reap more from the results of buying bonds than do our parents. Postwar security means more for us; we have more to win or lose; we are younger and, therefore have longer to live under whatever conditions exist after the war, be they good or bad.

Stamps and bonds will buy these materials. If, however, the Allies lose for lack of supplies, youth will face a life dominated by Hitler ideals.

Youth is the time to learn the practice of thrift. The buying of stamps and bonds is a

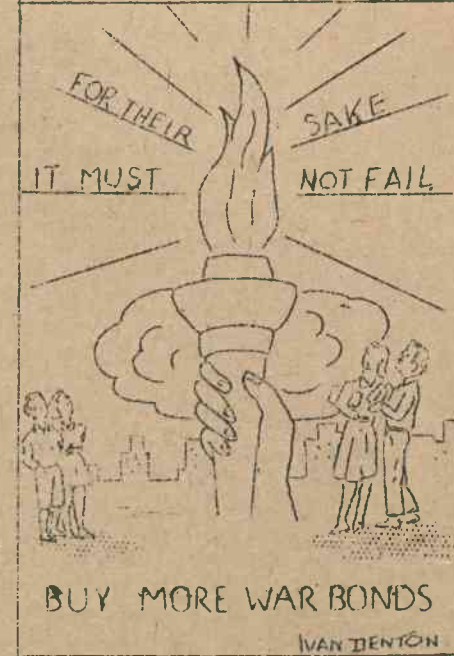

Again, a nest egg started by purchasing stamps and bonds will be found most welcome ten years from now when we students will probably be starting upon a home of our own.

To our parents bonds are a challenge to preserve for their children the democratic way of living expressed in the four freedoms and to secure a speedy and permanent peace. For them, too, bonds are an investment in security for old age, and means to fulfill dreams of comforts and cherished objectives.

Bonds may be thought of as a seed that will later sprout VICTORY and in that victory a future security and peace. Every penny invested will give US a share in that victory. He also fights as a good soldier, be he young or old, who works at home and lends his money to the war effort.
