The weaknesses of falling for flattery and talking too much have continued till the present time.

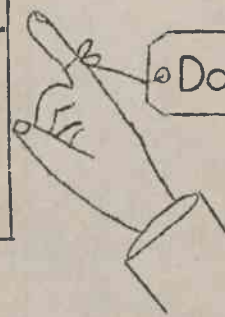
These are only a few examples showing that human nature has developed little in comparison with the advances in mechanical and scientific fields.

Principal Weaver states that the reason for this short schedule is to permit the pupils to help pick cotton, harvest the hay, and dig the sweet potato crop.

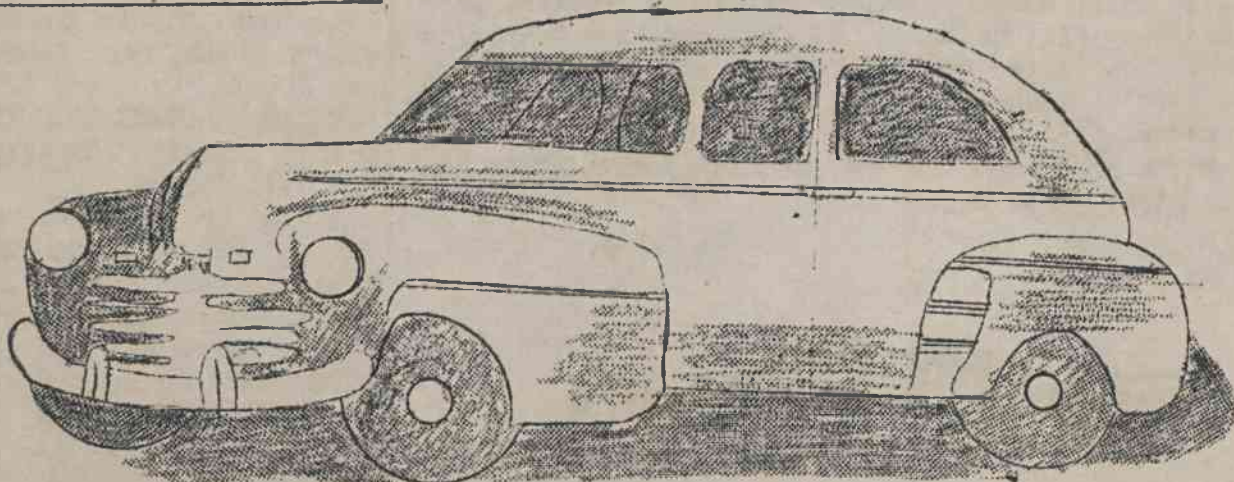
In order to dismiss by 1:20, school takes in thirty minutes earlier, has shorter class periods, and no activity period.
