

## Harris Advises Simplicity In Landscaping

Points given by J.R. Harris, of the extension department of State College, on landscaping are reviewed to the students by the teachers who are members of the Virginia Dare Book Club.

The basic point of landscaping, according to Mr. Harris is simplicity. A simple layout should consist of a green lawn and well-balanced shrubbery affording a background.

### SUGGESTIONS

Pecans and dogweeds were the trees most stressed for backgrounds. As a cover for garages or other outdoor buildings, ivy was suggested as a tender, green, crispness the year round.

To be enjoyed, only few perennials should be attempted, further stated Mr. Harris. In these, colors should be grouped to bring out the luster in each group. That a yard should never be cluttered with walks or drives, an error that often spoils the entire layout, was demonstrated.
