## Beverly Tapp Named Collector Of Month

Shoes of gold are from Arkansas and Louisiana. Those of Tennessee and Illinois are made of wood.

Each of these states are represented by two pairs: North Carolina, stone and glass; Kentucky, glass and wood; Oklahoma, wood and gold. Beverly has only one pair of bronze ones; they are from Colorado.

She has five pair of shoes from other countries. They represent Belgium, Mexico, Canada, Australia, and France. These are made of wood, stone, glass, shells, and wood respectively.

For a display case, Beverly's father is going to make her a whatnot in the shape of a shoe. It will be made of mahogany and have shelves in it like regular whatnots. Beverly hopes to have a pair of shoes from every state before her father completes her case.
