CARE

Mark only for assignments and erase those marks after the assignment has been completed. Do not allow baby brother or sister to deface and soil them. Be careful about breaking the backs of books. Keep pencils and other things out of books while they are closed.

Do not dog ear books. The corners of the pages will soon tear off.

REPLACEMENTS

Much difficulty has been experienced during this year in getting books. New adoptions have been made in many subjects. Those books have come through slowly. Replacements for old adoptions have in many cases been impossible to get. If care is taken of the books we have, fewer students will be deprived of this important tool.

Probably, most important of all, do not lose or misplace them.
