BAILEY RANKS THIRD IN CROPS CONTEST

Representing Bailey in the Nash-Edgcombe crops contest held in the Bailey FFA building, Monday, January 20, Keith Glover, Tommy Sanders, and Irvin Finch Jr. won third place. Benvenue and West Edgcombe won first and second place respectively and are eligible to compete in the state contest at Shelby, January 30.

The contest, directed by Mr. R. J. Peeler, state executive secretary, consisted of seed judging and seed identification. Fifty samples of seed or plants were to be identified and four samples of three different kinds of seed to be judged. Ten teams from the federation, consisting of three members each competed.

NIXON WINS PIG LITTER CONTEST

Harry Lee Nixon, a member of the Bailey chapter of the Future Farmers of America was named winner in the statewide pig litter contest, it was announced by R. J. Peeler, executive secretary of N. C. Association of the FFA. This contest was sponsored by the N. C. FFA Association.

Harry's sow farrowed 10 pigs which weighed a total of 359 pounds at six weeks of age. The mortality rate of pigs during the first six weeks, farrowed by sows owned and managed by FFA boys throughout the State, was 12.2 per cent. The State average is above 30 per cent.
