## MAPS

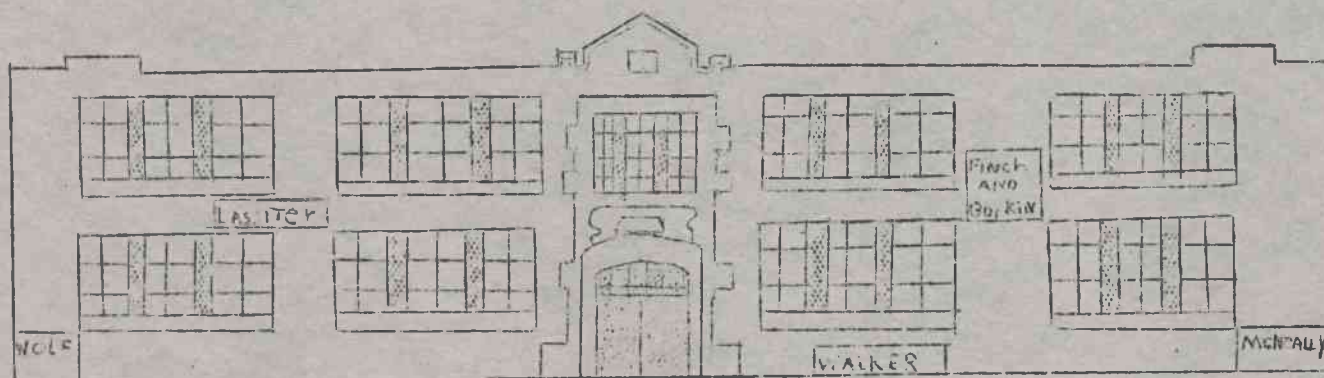
