The airgram will be a post war adaptation of V-mail. It will consist of a light, single sheet of paper, which, when folded, becomes a sealable, stamped envelope, but unlike V-mail it will not be photographed."

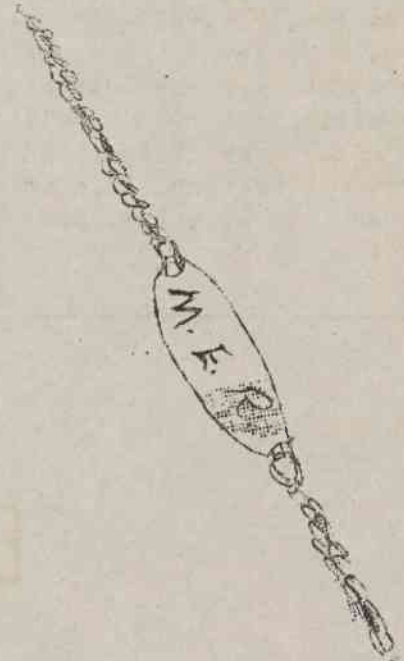
