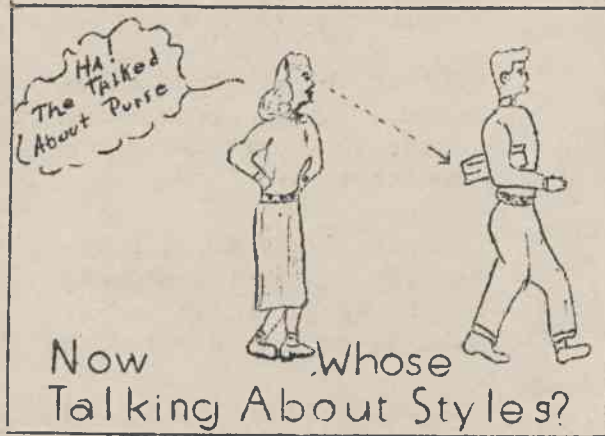


# Fashions, Fancies, And Frills - By Bernese Eatmon
