County Dr. Directs Pre-school Clinic

Checking smallpox and diphtheria vaccinations, teeth, tonsils, lungs, and heart was the purpose of the pre-school clinic recently conducted at BHS by the county doctor and nurse.

The North Carolina State law requires that a child be vaccinated for smallpox and diphtheria and recommends that he be vaccinated for whooping cough before he starts to school.

Thirty-four children who are six years old or who will be six by October 2 were examined at the clinic. Those who failed to come to the clinic will be required to bring from a doctor a statement showing that the child has been vaccinated.

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
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
