April 23 Clean - W Sets For MISS E, FARMER JOINS NATIONAL MATH CLUB CHAIRMEN TO MEET APRIL 19

Miss Edith Farmer, high school math and senior home room teacher, has been given the opportunity to join the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics.

This is "the only national organization devoted solely to the improvement of the teaching of elementary

and secondary school mathematics."

The invitation was extended on the basis of her "interest in mathematics and upon the recommendation of the National Council representative in her State."

STAFF SETS REQUISITES FOR MEMBERSHIP

6. Only A and B students except in special cases where aptitudes reveal special abilities needed by the paper.

7. No freshmen except by special permission--said permission to be based on qualifications of students.

English Gr. Constitutes Six-weeks Work

English projects for the six weeks of grammar include emphasis on developing a composition, understanding complex sentences, verbs and verbals, and increasing one's vocabulary.

After learning the details of writing an expository composition, each senior has made an outline and a bibliography and is writing a lengthy composition on any subject that interests him. Writing from the heart has been stressed rather than for the teacher.

Verbals, vocabulary building, and pronunciation are the sophomore and freshmen units.

In addition the freshmen have made a thorough study of the conjugation vorbs.
