

# Class Applies Citizenship

Voting by secret ballot and a clean-up campaign comprise activities of civics classes in putting the study of citizenship into action.

Replacing the unpainted cardboard trash boxes in the halls, library, sick-room, and study hall with fresh painted ones was the first project chosen by the class.

Following the completion of the trash boxes, posters were designed and made by the girls. These posters reminding students to keep the building clean, were placed over or near the trash boxes. Posters carried such well known quotations as "Cleanliness is next to Godliness" or rhymes made up by members.

The next job undertaken was that of giving the sick room a face-lifting. Sheets and pillow cases were contributed by various students. Others were

made of feed sacks and embroidered. Bailey Dry Cleaners cleaned the blanket free of charge, and the curtains were laundered. A dressing table and stool were made with assistance from the boys' class. Health posters were pinned on the walls, and a plant added the finishing touch.

Not all the work, however, has been done by the girls. Once a week the boys go outside, equipped with homemade paper-pickers, and clean the grounds.

To prepare themselves for future voting, they held an election using the system of Australian secret ballot. Both classes

voted on conduct points and superlatives for the freshmen.

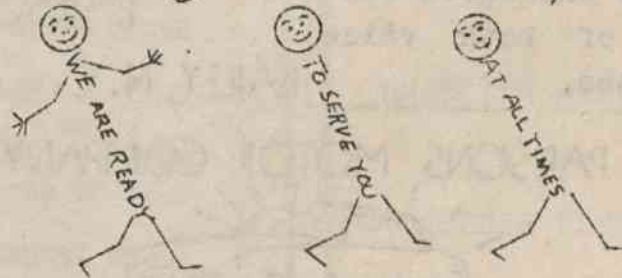
