Students Pay Over \$3,000
During Opening Days

For the first twelve days each student paid out in fees and other school bills an average of \$6.85, or a total of \$3,786.72. These figures are based on the enrollment of 553.

Last year's book has been audited, okayed, and returned by the special auditor. In the school year of '50 and '51 the school collections totaled \$21,735.27. Bills paid out amounted to \$21,4885.01, leaving a \$250.26 balance.
