Bookkeeping Leads In Students Enrolled In Commercial Dept.

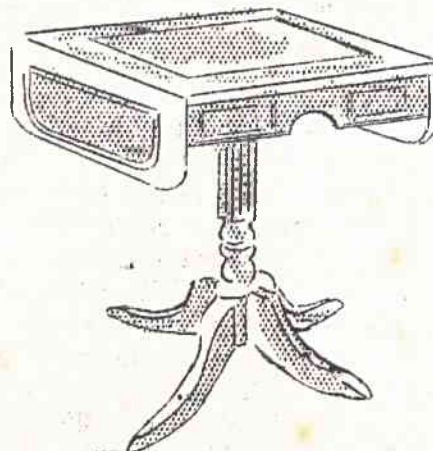
Of the 101 students enrolled in the Commercial department this year thirty-three are taking bookkeeping, "The largest class I have ever taught in this course," says MRS. L. T. LASSITER, teacher.

The commercial department is open to juniors and seniors only.

Thirty-two students are taking Typing I. They are divided into two classes, as the department has 22 machines.

Returning for a second year in typing are 21 students.

Fifteen seniors are using a new book, WORLD GEOGRAPHY by Bradley, in their study of geography this year. "Not having had any geography since the elementary grades, the students knowledge of geography is limited," states the instructor.



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
