The high school library opened with an addition of two new books. Miss Oglesby stresses the point that all books should be handled with care because of the expense and time for repairs of damages.

Ten magazines are in the school library for student's use and pleasure at all times. Also are three different newspapers: THE NEWS AND OBSERVER, THE BATLEY NEWS, and THE NASHVILLE GRAPHIC.

Books are loaned for a period of two weeks at the time. Persons keeping tooks overdue are charged two cents a day.

The money received in this way is used for repair of books, buying new books, and general care of the library.

Six different students excedite the work of the library by helping students to look up references, keeping books in alphabetical order, and checking the books out.

Grading Permits Changes In Playground

Grading of the school ground during the summer at an approximate cost of \$850 makes possible additional playground for all students and the beautification of the front grounds.
