After the tour of the school the visitors ascended an improvised platform, In front of the main building, decorated in the Turwhite. From here Mayor Griffin extended "welcome to the representatives of a tobacco-growing country from a tobacco-growing community."

Congressman Cooley introduced President Bayar to an estimated crowd of 2500 to 3,000 who had turned out for the visit. The President in his brief message, translated into English by his interpreter, said, after expressing his appreciation of the welcome given, "I have heard the voices of the youth to which the future belongs," and added, "What happens tomorrow will be determined by the youth!"

At the close of the President's remarks Mrs. R. M. Meacomes presented President and Madame Bayar a pine plaque cut in the shape of North Carolina toast of the with the state burned thereon and native with decorated cones and dried flowers; Peggy Liles, editor of the school paper, a copy of the Bugle; and Miss Frances Wilson, representing the school, a bouquet of red roses to Madam Bayar. Bailey's stop came on the last day of the American tour and was the only one made to a small school.

Finished is the new science laboratory, the upstairs girls' toilet, and the improvement made in the commerical department reports Principal Weaver; but the elementary library and classroom are yet to be completed.

At one end of the new science laboratory is a special partitioned section with shelves, cabinets, and individual drawers for storage and student material.

Opening out of this division is a dark room that will be used for experimentation with mirrors and lenses and the development of films.

At the opposite end of the laboratory is a work cabinet running the full width of the room. The laboratory is painted a sunshine yellow.

The bathroom that has been made possible up-

stairs by cutting off a small section of the former home economics department has two lavatories and four individual stalls with doors on each.

In order for Mrs. L.T. Lassiter to supervise work going on in both typing and bookkeeping rooms, there has been cut a door between the rooms.

The elementary library is to be moved downstairs in the room now occupied by the fifth grado. This grade will be transferred to the old science laboratory.

This library is to be as large as a regular classroom and will be equipped with tables and chairs, sized for children, a lavatory, running water, magazine racks, shelves, work tables, and a newspaper stand, if possible.
