

CULPRITS ARE UNDER ARREST

Damage done by the burglars, who broke into Bailey School, March 28, and have been arrested, was covered by burglar insurance, states Principal Weaver. This insurance covers all damages done by the burglars-damage to safe, money taken, window broken-at a cost of \$12 per year.

There was a tear gas bomb connected to the safe. It was broken but it seemed not to have any effect.

CASH TAKEN

\$75.68 in monoy was taken, two sections of the window broken out, and the safe ripped open.

The culprits also went into Mrs. R. G. L. Edwards' eighth grade and the agriculture building.

They didn't get anything in Mrs. Edwards' room except a baseball bat. The tools used to break into the office were taken from the agriculture building. These were later founding the pasture behind the school building.

Principal Weaver reports that the insurance adjuster authorized the purchase of a new safe. The safe has been bought.

These same boys broke into Farmer Brothers Store that night.
