Funk 785 Proves Best In Corn Test

Funk 785 turned out to be the best variety of corn in a test crop this year with a 63.2 bushels per acre average. Twelve different varieties of hybrid corn were planted side by side, under the same conditions.

All varieties were judged by definite standards: number of erect plants standing, height of ear, ear tip coverage, grain quality, resistance to dry weather and heat, and freedom from weevils.

Other varieties which turned out to be good this year were Dixie C2 with 62 bushels per acre average; Dixie 19 with 60 bushels; Coker's 911 and F-11 with 54 bushels; N. C. 31 and N. C. 27 with 50.5 bushels.

John R. Lamm and Corny Boykin grew the corn.
