6. Quiet, please. Hush

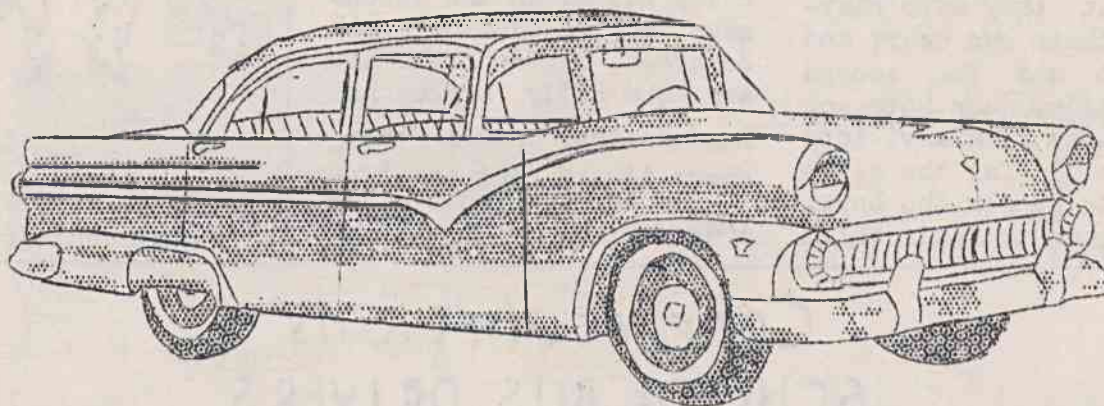
