Juniors Out Front In Attendance Record

During the second and third months the juniors had 45 absences, or 95% record for each month.

March Of Dimes Drive To Start Jan. 3

January 3 marks the opening of the 1955 March of Dimes campaign throughout the country. As everyone knows, the money contributed will be used in diminishing the "dreaded disease of polio."

Polio strikes both old and young. However, statistics prove that four out of every five stricken are young people.

The young people are realizing that this is very much their battle. Many are forming a Teens Against Polio drive in their communities. In this organization they are raising money by means of sponsoring parties, sports

events, fashion shows, king and queen contests, auctions, and many other ways. Others who haven't done so are asked to form similar organizations.

The March of Dimes organization is now not only helping the already stricken but using its money for research in the Salk vaccine, gamma globulin, to prevent others from having it.

1954 was the third highest polio year on record with almost 40,000 cases reported. Contributions will help to allay its spread it is believed, for it will enable further study.
