The home economics department lays claim to six of these teachers from East Carolina College.

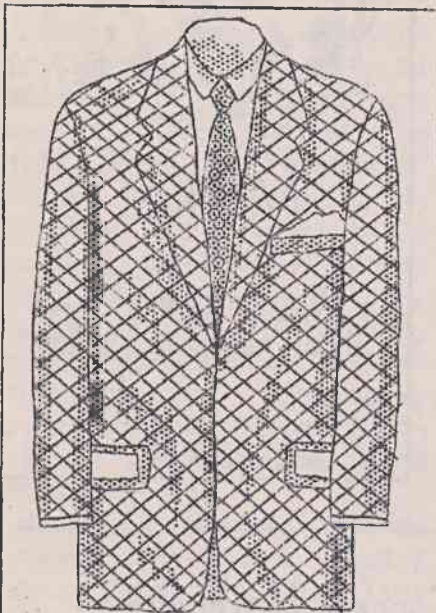
Their adviser says, "Having juniors would receive from the contest. Different from previous programs, Mrs. Howard Farmer's sophomores gave a competitive song feast.
