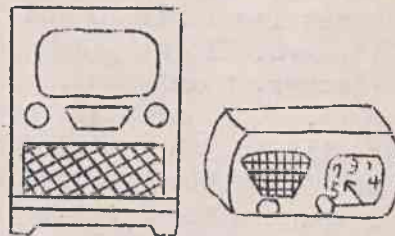
The group of boys we'll meet shortly are seniors. Teasing someone or shouting forth a smart remark is certainly a characteristic of them.
