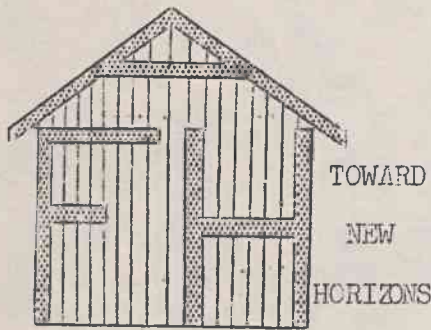


'Busy Year Adds Interest To FHA Work' Members Declare
