Winner of the second prize will receive \$200 cash, while the third place winner will receive \$100. Fourth prize will be \$75, and fifth prize is \#50. Cash awards will also be presented to district winners.
This is not at all the only contest offered to Bailey's students, for they have been given the opportunity to compete in the World Peace Contest; the Medical Essay Contest, and the Betty Crocker contest for senior girls.
