The whistle blew! Everyone headed for the bench. Principal Weaver introduced each one to the

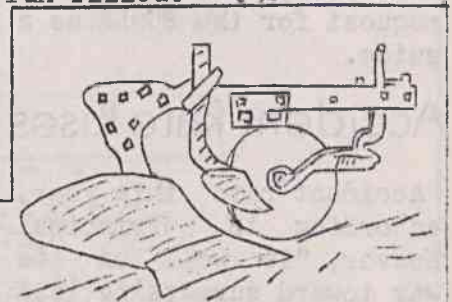
team members, and Horne were given opportunities to express themselves.
