The school grounds received a "high rating." "One fault", said the inspector, as he noticed the torn guard wire at the end of the upstairs landing.

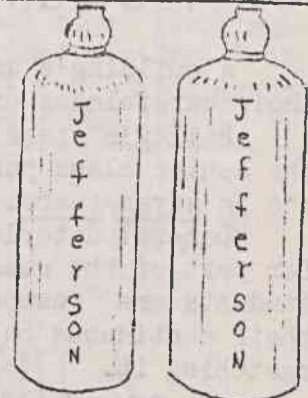

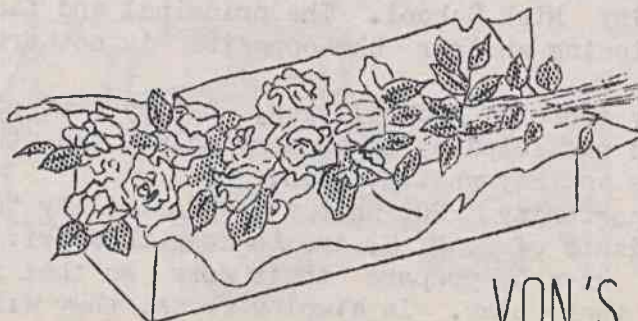
