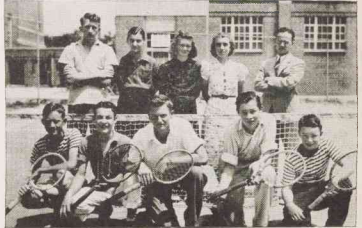

Netters End Season

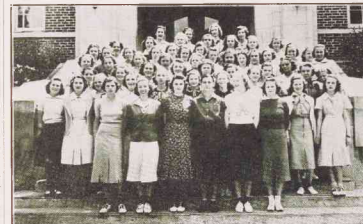
