

Driving Students Making Progress

Instructions for twelve students per day is now being given by Tommy Stoker, an officer of the local police force. This instruction was formerly provided by J. C. Lowder, who is no longer a member of the force.

At least three or four prospective drivers are ready to obtain their licenses, but on the average, it takes approximately five weeks to complete the course satisfactorily. When a number of students are ready to take the test, license examiner Archie McQueen will come to the school, but if only two or three are ready at one time, they will be asked to go to Mr. McQueen's office.

The course is offered only to those students who have a study hall; however, it may be offered to others at a later date. Approximately 100 students are expected to complete the course by the end of school.
