
Cheerers Sport New Uniforms

Mouth Pieces Are Given To Players By Local Dentist

Dr. M. B. Richardson has fitted each of the 37 football players with a rubber mouth piece designed by the University of North Carolina.

Each player had to have an impression of his mouth made. The boys went to Dr. Richardson's office, a few each day, until all of them had had an impression made. The boys helped him make the mouth pieces by coming to the mouth pieces by coming to the home economics room of the high school for two nights. The first night they painted the im-pressions with a liquid rubber and put them in the ovens to cure. The curing required 24 hours. The team returned to the school the next night to trim the mouth pieces and then they

were ready for use. The Bulldogs have used the mouth pieces in recent games and report they are very satisfactory.
