Next came China Grove, which the boys won 7-6. Lexington started the Bulldogs on a three-game losing streak by beating them 12-7. On the next game, Concord's Spiders emerged victorious, 18-0 The Kannapolis game followed, and again the Bulldogs came out on the short end, this time by a 20-0 score. Albemarle got on the victory trail again in the next two games, downing Thomas-ville 20-14, and winning 6-0 over Landis. A strong Rockingham team brought them back to earth the next week, however, gain-ing a 20-0 victory. Statesville then added a sour note to the Homecoming game by defeating the Bulldogs 19-14. And, in the season's finale, despite a fine team effort, the Bulldogs were denied their fifth victory of the season, losting 13-0 to Asheboro
