Betty, besides being an outstanding scholastic student, is editor of the *Full Moon*, a member of the Honor Society, and has participated on the debate team. In her junior year Betty served as secretary for the Student Council. For the past three summers she attended summer school at Appalachian State College, Wake Forest College, and Woman's College, respectively. Betty plans to major in math or physics at Duke University.

Sharron has also been very active in school activities. She is serving as editor for the *Crossroads*, is a member of the National Honor Society, and participated on both the basketball and tennis teams. Sharron attended the Wildacres conference last summer. Having been awarded a Trustee's scholarship, Sharron will attend Pfeiffer College and major in biology.

## Two Sophs Make Advanced School

Two sophomores from ASHS, Allison Harris and Tom Webb, will attend the 1964 Governor's School which will be held at Salem College. Allison will work in the field of English and Tom will work in the field of natural science.

Four hundred students from all over North Carolina will begin work at the Governor's School in June. The instructors are chosen from high schools and colleges from North Carolina and other states.

For three hours each morning, five days a week, each student attends a seminar in his major subject, English, foreign languages, mathematics, social science, or natural sciences on the academic side; painting, drama, dance, or music in the performing arts. By the end of the session, each will have completed the equivalent of a year's work in his subject.

Outside speakers, conductors, and artists will add to the sessions. There will be no formal homework assignments given during the summer although the library will be open each night. No formal tests on subject matter will be given in the courses.
