### Dr. Frankel Sounds Forth On Idealism

Sixteen students attended the third Jefferson Standard High School Award Convocation of 1966-67, Saturday, March 11, at Ovens Auditorium in Charlotte.

Dr. Charles Frankel, Assistant Secretary of State for Educational and Cultural Affairs, spoke on "Idealism and Realism in Politics."

Pointing out that idealism without realism was "not only naive but also cruel," Dr. Frankel explained that there were three things a person must do to correctly mix the two.

These three steps are as follows: (1) mind one's own business; (2) distinguish between long-term purposes and short-term principles; and (3) make one of the long-term goals a struggle in one's life.

A panel discussion, conducted by several outstanding students from the Charlotte schools, followed Dr. Frankel's talk.

The Senior Choir and the Varsity Singers competed in the District Choral Concert in Charlotte's Ovens Auditorium, March 10.

The Senior Choir competing in Class III, received a superior rating, one of 17 highest ratings given; the Varsity Singers, participating in Class IV, received an excellent plus rating.

Since the contest was so large, it was necessary to have two sets of judges. The morning judges included Miss Jean Meredith of Grimsley High School, E. L. Williams of Greensboro College, and Mrs. Chrystal Bachtell as supervisor, also of Greensboro.

The afternoon judges were Miss Ann Rouster of Hickory, Mr. Bob Alexander of Wilmington, and Perry Watson of N. C. State University, Raleigh.

The choruses were judged on the standard of superior, excellent, good, fair, and poor, not by their competition with the other groups. The rating was also determined by the difficulty of musical selections.

Forty-five choral groups, including girls' choruses and boys' glee clubs, were represented; the Varsity Singers was the smallest. Approximately 3,000 singers participated.
