photography, painting, drawing, and homemaking.

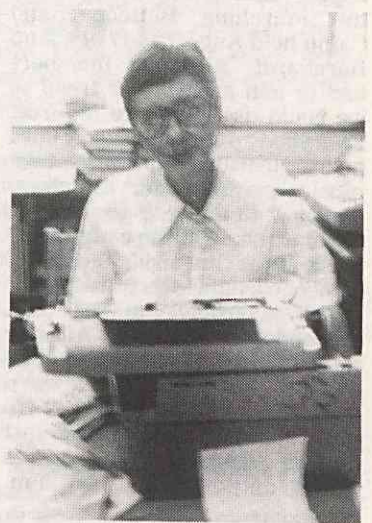
New in the English and Math departments is Mrs. Cooper. For the past seven years, she has been at Junior High. Mrs. Cooper

The FBLA is the national vocational organization for students participating in business and office programs. The purpose is to provide, as an integral part of the instructional program, additional opportunities for secondary students (grades 7-12) in business and office education to develop vocational and career supported civic and personal responsibility.
