

BOBBY BREEN STARRED IN EXCITING STORY OF LOUISIANA'S COLORFUL BAYOU COUNTRY

Bringing to the screen with abundant color a segment of life in the old South little known to present day audiences, "Way Down South" with Bobby Breen as its star will open next Monday at the Highlands School Theatre.
