WATER IMPROVEMENTS TO BEGIN IMMEDIATELY

At a meeting of the mayor and board of commissioners last Saturday, several bids were presented for the proposed water improvements for the town, and the bid of John G. Owens, of Franklin, registered engineer, was accepted by the board.

Mr. Owens will make the necessary investigation of the present water system in the town with reference to pipe sizes, capacities, pressures and quantities, and will draft a report and recommendations on this investigation for the approval of the board. He will also obtain the approval of the State Board of Health and the WPA on all plans and designs.

Native stone will be used wherever needed in this work, and the town given credit for same; credit will also be given for any materials the town has on hand.

ANNUAL MEETING OF HIGHLANDS MUSEUM AND BIOLOGICAL LABORATORY HELD LAST SATURDAY

The Ninth Annual Meeting of the Museum and Biological Laboratory was held at the Weyman Memorial Laboratory on August 26th. All of the officers were re-elected with the exception of Dr. Hessler, vice president, who was replaced by Dr. E.E. Reinke, due to the fact that Dr. Hessler could so seldom be here.

In a short talk Dr. Foreman predicted that the very near future would see the laboratory and the museum operating separately, each having its own board of trustees.

Dr. Leland Shanor, acting curator, estimated the number of people visiting the museum during July and August to be four hundred. He spoke of interesting trips sponsored by the museum, the mounted specimen of Northern Raven given to the Museum by Dr. Clark Foreman, of Washington, D. C., and the aquaria presented by Dr. William Duane, of Philadelphia.

The very beautiful water colors of native plants on the walls of the laboratory made by Mrs. Mary Motz Wills, were very much admired by the visitors at this meeting.

Announcement was made at this meeting that work would begin on the museum building on September 10th.

Cakes and punch were served in the laboratory after the meeting.
