Summarized briefly these functions are: (1) to direct self-expression; (2) to promote interest in the national and international life; (3) to direct the college student into other fields of literature; (4) to enhance the opportunity for students interested in journalism.

He said that a magazine was the direct expression of the lives of the students. He thought it should contain articles on science, politics, business, art, music, and drama, and he stressed especially the following departments for a magazine: (1) editorials; (2) open forum; (3) literary essays; (4) short stories; (5) science; (6) art, including music, and the drama; (7) humor, provided the college has no purely humorous publica-
