

In Los Angeles, California, on Saturday afternoon, June 23, 1945, the S. S. Meredith Victory, the 10,500-ton Victory Ship named by the United States Maritime Commission in honor of Meredith College, Raleigh, N. C., received a ceremonious christening and was launched into the Los Angeles Harbor. Mrs. Harry B. Livingston, wife of the British consul general, christened the Meredith Victory with the assistance of Mrs. John Blood-Smythe who acted as matron of honor at the christen-
