In addition to enriching the educational process, the objectives of the program are to: (1) Provide opportunities for students to become involved in early career exploration as a basis for making realistic decisions regarding their future careers, and (2) to support affirmative action programs, through a career awareness approach, to assure that ethnic and racial minorities, women and the handicapped are informed of occupations available within the Government.
