Qui Jin — is the story of a *fin de siecle* feminist, poet and revolutionary. She not only rebelled against the ruling Qing Dynasty but defied conventional social mores. Leaving behind her husband and children, she joined other student radicals in Japan. In 1907, her revolutionary activities led to her execution by the Manchus. - Run Away Set at the turbulent end of the T'ang Dynasty, Run Away tells the story of desperate bandits who propose to exchange their kidnap victim for food. But the victim

falls in love with one of her captors and he must then choose between her and his comrades in arms. Run Away is an exciting new action film by Wang Tung. With Ma Ruh-fong, Chaung Yin-jeng, Dern Big-Chen, Wang Rey. Directed by Wang Tung. From Taiwan, 1984, 114 minutes.

At Middle Age — Through the story of a middle-aged doctor facing illhealth, At Middle Age deals with tragedy of that generation of young Chinese "lost" to the Cultural Revolution. Based on one of the most emotionally incisive novels of the past decade, the film has won awards as best feature and for best actress.

credit cards are accepted for payment. For information call 737-3104 or write P.O. Box 7306, Raleigh






A valentine symphony
