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One of these days, after fishing or gardening or even erranding far into a meal hour, throw together a quick batch of OATMEAL SOUP, the following recipe for which was obtained from a reliable Swiss cook in the mountains a few miles above Glarus.

Allow three heaping teaspoons of oatmeal for each person. Brown it is a hunk of butter—maybe a couple tablespoons. Margarine works fine, too. Add a cup or bowl of liquid per person, along with a bouillon cube apiece (chicken or beef or broth), parsley, some chopped onion, a bay leaf, and a clove. Simmer until oatmeal is done.
