A number of people in Pine Knoll Shores are reporting disappointing results with crape myrtle plants they have purchased through the Pine Knoll Shores Garden Club during FIRST AID FOR their ongoing town beautification project. The extreme heat and dryness of this summer is very hard on first year or even second year plants.

CRAPE MYRTLE If some of your plants appear to be nearly dead, they may still revive with proper treatment. Lift the plants and cut back about one-third on roots and foliage. Replant them in pots in a mixture of peat and topsoil and put in a sheltered location on the south side of your house for the winter. Keep very well watered and replant them in early spring - late in February is a good time. Remember to continue to water heavily those plants still in your yard. Even though the plants are established, they need lots of water.
