## Who Does Kayak for the Warriors Support?

Sgt. Sean DeBevoise, USMC (Ret.) currently lives in Hamlet, North Carolina, but grew up in New City, New York. He was deployed three times—once to Haiti and twice to Camp Fallujah, Iraq. While he was a scout sniper with the 2nd Reconnaissance Battalion, Sean's Humvee was hit by IEDs twice—first in April 2006, and again in early May 2006. On May 17, 2006, on a combat raid outside the city of Zaidon, Sean received shrapnel and four bullet wounds across his body, including one that penetrated his head. Sean medically retired from the Marine Corps in June 2009, and is currently pursuing an associate degree with an emphasis in legal studies. In his free time, Sean is an active member of Team Hope For The Warriors\*, and raced on his handcycle in last year's Tunnel to Towers Race in New York and in the Marine Corps Marathon.

Sean is but one of the many wounded warriors who have returned to civilian life after suffering grievous injuries. The road to recovery is long and arduous. This is where Hope For The Warriors<sup>®</sup> comes in.
