Welcome to Dorothy Andrews, new employee in the Supply Room. Also, we're glad to see "Dal" Troxler back at work.

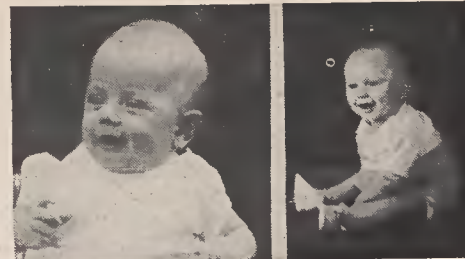
Congratulations and good wishes to William H. Black, Shearing Room employee, who was married September 22 to Miss Barbara Brown.
