Livingstone To Speak And Show Domestic Lines For Women's Club

He will describe and display samples of some of the leading products in our domestic lines.

He will show Royal Velvet and Deauville towels, the Triumph Jacquard blanket, the new Rockingham summer weight blanket, fitted Luxuray blanket, Mar-Ray Blanket and the May Garden screen print blankets, plus three colors of the Sydney all-wool blanket.

He will display the new Nylomar nylon blend blanket, a Pompey Red electric blanket, and will show scalloped sheets, fitted sheets, embroidered sheets, and our complete line of colored and screen printed sheets.

Sanforized bedspreads he will show include our Marionette jacquard patterns, the Concord colonial type spread in white and natural, a Stardust pattern and a complete ensemble of our Day-break patterns. He also will display and discuss Crosspoint, the simulated hand crocheted spread for which our Research Dept. developed an entirely new weave and perfected the loom modifications necessary for making the spread which looks like handiwork.

Mr. Livingstone will speak following a luncheon at the clubhouse on Stockton street in Princeton. Last week's speaker before the Present Day Club was Dr. Frank P. Graham, former president of the University of North Carolina and United States Senator from this State who is associated with the United Nations. Frederic W. Hoit, Fieldcrest vice president in charge of domestic sales, previously spoke before the club.

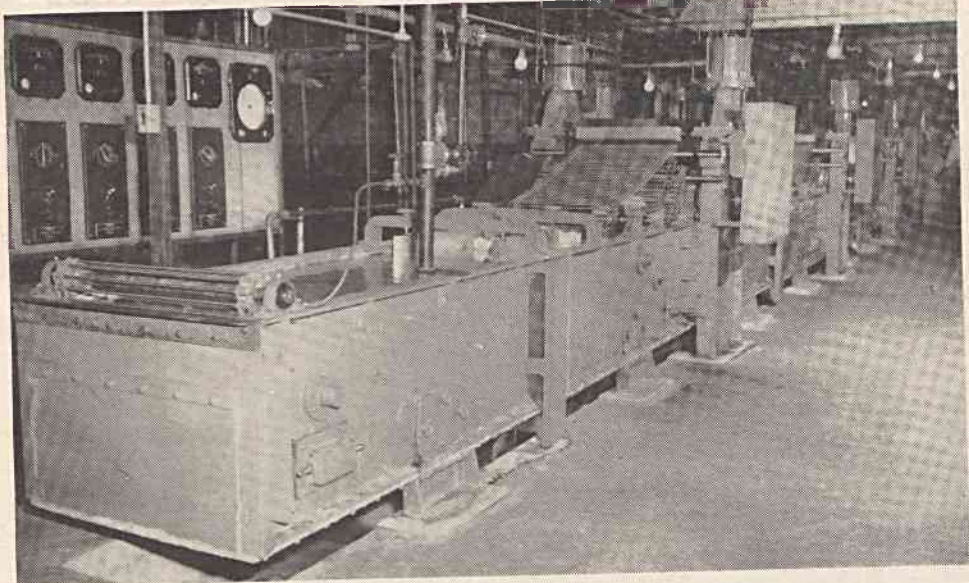
Letters From Servicemen

Karastan Gets New Continuous Scouring Machine



This latest-model Sargents 4-bowl continuous skein scouring machine was put into operation at the Karastan Rug Mill October 1. The new unit gives improved quality of scouring and the extra capacity needed for new machinery already installed at Karastan and additional machinery expected to be installed early in 1955.

The former boiler room space at Karastan was remodeled to make room for the new scouring machine which is approximately 75 feet long. A part of the building alterations was construction of a new room for chemical storage, soap mixing tanks, etc., providing the Dyeing Department with badly needed additional space.

S. S. Flythe Appointed To Highway Commission

S. S. Flythe of Fieldale has been appointed to the Virginia State Highway Commission by Governor Thomas B. Stanley. The appointment was announced October 11 and Mr. Flythe qualified October 13. He attended his first meeting with the full Commission in Richmond October 19. He represents the Salem road district comprised of Henry, Patrick, Carroll, Pulaski, Giles, Montgomery, Botetourt, Bedford and Roanoke counties.

Mr. Flythe, now president of the First National Bank in Martinsville, maintains his home at Fieldale, where he was vice president and cashier of the Bank of Fieldale for 19 years before going to the Martinsville bank as executive vice president in January, 1947.

He became president of the First National Bank in September, 1954. He has long been active in community affairs at Fieldale and had an active part in the successful establishment of Fieldale Sanitary District some years ago.
